History of Riders

- 1 A PETE VANKEMPEN. "This boy is the biggest drawing card and the most colorful rider in the game today." These were the words of our own Norman Hill after Hill could not ride, due to an accident, in the six-day race in the Madison Square Garden. If Hill makes this recommendation it must be true, so just keep your eyes on this boy often.
- 1 B. JACK McCOY. A genuine San Francisco lad. Placed fifth in one of the six-day races in Los Angeles and sixth in another. He has always had tough luck, but this is his great opportunity and we look for Jackie to make the best of it.
- 2 A HENRY "COCKY" O'BRIEN. California's greatest rider for the past three years. Has just returned from his first six-day race in Madison Square Garden last week. A true son of the old sod. Ready to smile or fight at any moment. Has crossed the line winner twice in two six-day races.
- 2 B CECIL "RABBITT" YATES. Has ridden in four six-day races on eastern tracks. Former state champion of Illinois. A worthy son of your Emerald Isle.
- 3 A FRANZ DUELBERG. Winner of six-day race in Detroit with Jimmie Walthour, also one in Chicago with Walthour. Won the Chicago 1931 race with Bill Grimm, and won his last six-day race in Germany. One of the outstanding foreign six-day bicycle racers to come to this country.
- 3 B. STEVE O'CONNOR. Was 1929 runner-up for the American Championship at Atlantic City. In 1928 was Pacific Coast Champion. Known as the "Irish Flyer." A veteran six-day bicycle racer. The team of O'Connor and Duelberg are rated even money to win this race.

- 4 A RUGGERO "RED" BERTI. San Jose Italian. On of the most likeable boys to ride a bike. Star of the American Olympic team, 1932. Won the first six-day race he ever competed in. In sprinting there are few men riding today who can "take"
- 4 B. EDDIE TESTA. The other member of this great Italian team of Berti and Testa. Quiet and pleasing personality, but a demon when the going gets hard. Eddie won't give an inch on those banked turns to anyone.
- 5 A. RUSSELL ALLEN. Born in Leipsic, Germany. Winner of the Western Board Championship in 1931. Member of the American Olympic Team in 1932. Took fourth place in his second six-day race.
- 5 B. FREDERICK SCHULTZ. Born in Berlin, Germany. One of the biggest men riding board tracks. Tremendous power in those legs may mean that this German of the race.
- 6 A IRVINE SCHUELLER. Berkeley boy. A veteran of six-day racing even though only 19 years old. With Echeverria as his team mate, this will be a team full of thrills.
- 6 B. BOBBIE ECHEVERRIA. Another 19 year old boy. Spanish. Has ridden in two six-day races. One of the most fearless riders before the American public today. Here's the boy for your thrills.
- 7 A TED SNAVELY. Irish laddie. Took second place in his first six-day race. Has ridden on eastern board tracks, and has also done considerable riding in motor pacing.
- 7 B. ARCHIE RASMUSSEN. The daring Dane. Present sprint champion of Northem California. Can start his bicycle faster than any rider in the race and is extremely fast on a track such as this.
- 8 A RAY BORAME. Born in the shadow of the Seine, Paris, France. Learned the bike game at the Pare Des Princes and Veledrome D'Hiver. Holder of the Pacific Coast record for the one-half mile unpaced, time I minute and 3 seconds. One of the fastest unpaced riders in America today.
- 8 B. VIC BILELLO. Born in Pau, Southern France. His father was one of the greatest long distance road riders of France. He has competed in five six-day races, two in this country.
- 9 A CLIFF COLE. One of the neatest men on a bicycle in this race. Watch his form.

 He will be one of the first out in front whenever a sprint starts. It will take great riding for any team to lap Cole and Parker.
- 9 B. BUSS PARKER. Born in England. Has ridden three six-day races and considerable sprint races on board tracks throughout America and England. He holds a win over the great Eddie Testa.

- 10 A. WILLIE RABEL. For perpetual motion watch this blond German. When the rest are tiring after a jam, Willie is going along with hardly any effort. Wears the battle scars of many a spill in six-day racing.
- 10 B. RAUL LARRAZOLA. Born in Mexico City. Won the Torreon, 300-mile race in Mexico and finished second in the race from Mexico City to Texcoca and return. Has ridden in three six-day races. Likes the going fast and furious and withal is a very likeable little fellow.
- 11 A. RENI DIENER. Born in Lyons, France. Has done all of his riding in and around Paris. This is his first six-day race in America. A hard trainer and from his press reports from Paris papers he should make this debut very successfully.
- 11 B. IRWIN MULLIN. The only rider in the race who has never ridden in a six-day race, but has competed in sprint programs on board tracks. He will be right there in the fast pace that will be set, and we look for him to be well up at the finish.
- 12 A. ARNO VON KANITZ. An experienced six-day rider from Austria. Has competed in two six-day races in America. Not a flashy sprinter, but is a plugger type and will get better as the race goes on. Holds numerous road records and
- 12 B. BRUCE RISLEY. This is Risley's second six-day race. He has a big following on eastern board tracks and he has told us he positively will finish in the money.
- 13 A GEARY MAY. Born in Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, Won the Junior City Championship in San Francisco in 1923. Was the 1926 Junior Champion at Louis. Finished fourth twice in two six-day races.
- 13 B. ADOLPH GOVERS. Watch this curly headed little mite when a sprint starts. He comes from nowhere in the pack, gets through a small hole and is usually over the line in the first three. He should be one of the crowd pleasers of this grind. A great little Hollander.
- 14 A. BOB CHURCH. Holder of all the records in the Hawaiian Islands from 10 to 250 miles. Has ridden 68 miles an hour paced by an automobile. His first race in America.
- 14 B. PETE HAGOPIAN. "Little Pete"—that's his name. The real hard luck kid of the six-day racing game. Has never finished a six-day race with the same partner he started with due to spills and injuries. You will like this little dark-skinned boy.
- 15 A. JIM "RED" DORAN. Comes from a great cycling family. His father and mother still hold the record for mixed tandem for 100 miles made thirty years ago and it still stands. This boy has a great future.
- 15 B. GEORGE ANTROBUS. The most outstanding Greek rider in America today. While never being a winner in a six-day race, he has always furnished his share of thrills. We feel certain he won't fail the fans this time.
